

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF SALE NOTICE

Whyte & Sons Auctioneers Limited, trading as Whyte's, exercises all reasonable care to ensure that all descriptions are reliable and accurate, and that each item is genuine unless the contrary is indicated. However, the descriptions are not intended to be, are not and are not to be taken to be, statements of fact or representations of fact in relation to the lot. They are statements of the opinion of Whyte's, and attention is particularly drawn to clause 5 set out below. Comments and opinions, which may be found in or on lots as labels, notes, lists, catalogue prices, or any other means of expression, do not constitute part of lot descriptions and are not to be taken as such unless they are made or specifically verified by Whyte's.

Clause 1

- (a) Each lot is put up subject to any reserve price imposed by the vendor (b) Subject to sub-clause (a) of this clause, the highest bidder for each lot shall be the buyer thereof
- (c) If any dispute arises as to the highest bidder the auctioneer shall have absolute discretion to determine the dispute and may put up again and re-sell the lot in respect of which the dispute arises

Clause 2

- (a) The bidding and advances shall be regulated by and at the absolute discretion of the auctioneer and he shall have the right to refuse any bid or bids. 

Circa 500BC to 500AD Iron Age. Irish stone head.

Limestone; broken at the base, lower part of mouth chipped. Weight: 3.52kg. The flattish facial composition comprises protuberant lentoid eyes with lightly defined eyelids, elongated triangular nose, and narrow open mouth, with minimally defined lips. There is a small hole (diameter: 4mm) in the centre of the mouth. The head is oval, with a narrow chin. In addition, the ears have been rendered as a large C-shaped raised outline at either side of the head.

It is notoriously difficult to be certain about the dating of an isolated stone head. The introduction of the carved stone head in Ireland can be traced to the Iron Age, but representations of the human head continued to be produced into the medieval period and beyond. Lorrha, Co. Tipperary is renowned for the wealth of its medieval heritage, but this stone head differs stylistically from the medieval examples at Lorrha, and there are reasonable grounds for regarding it as a prehistoric object. The Iron Age ('Celtic') carved stone head is characterised by simplicity of form. In the words of Barry Raftery, an authority on the Iron Age in Ireland, 'the realistic portrayal of the human form was of no great concern to Celtic craftsmen'. This stone head possesses a spare, primitive quality contrasting with the more naturalistic examples from the medieval period.

A number of stone heads provide parallels for this item, including one in Wakefield Museum, Yorkshire, dated 600 BC-AD 43, an example from Trabolgan, now in the National Museum of Ireland, and another in the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York, dated to the second to third centuries.

Etienne Rynne, writing on the corpus of Celtic stone heads in Ireland in 1972 noted that 'the hole in the mouth feature seems to be characteristic of some Celtic stone heads'. It has been suggested that it could be connected to the pouring of a liquid offering or libation into the mouth of the deity represented by the carved stone head during ceremonies.

The understated economy of the work suggests that this could well be a stone head dating from the Iron Age, although it must be recognised that such carved heads could be of more recent origin.

500BC to 500AD Iron Age. Irish stone head.

Granite, angled break at the base along one side. Weight: 8.78kg. Irregular, upright stone with flat base. The surface has rough overall texture, apart from the detail of the head/face and a tapered raised feature at the front, directly below the head. The back of the stone is curved. The outline of the head is smooth, projecting at an upward angle from the body of the stone.

Etienne Rynne, in considering the corpus of carved stone heads in Ireland in 1972, noted that the dating of these objects was 'extremely difficult', as features of pagan heads are paralleled in heads from the medieval period. Carved stone heads from the Iron Age in general are distinguished by simplicity in terms of the execution of the facial composition. In this instance, the work comprises nearly circular, slightly bulging eyes, broad nose and wide slit mouth with minimal definition of the lips. The only other area of the stone to be skilfully fashioned is in regard to a subtle, tapering 'throat' outlined below the front of the head. No attempt was made to define the ears or to include the hairline. Medieval stone heads in general were designed to project from a wall, like corbels, or in doorway arches. This stone head, with its flat base and upward tilting face, does not appear to have been designed to fit into a wall in that way, but seems intended to function more as a portable item, like a bust.

The wide mouth can be compared to a stone figure on a large stele from Holzgerlingen, Wurttemberg, dated to c. 380 BC, and a head from the sanctuary of Roquepertuse near Aix-en-Province, dated to the fourth century BC. The combination of circular eyes and broad nose has affinities with pre-Christian stone carvings kept at Armagh Cathedral. A face carved into a stone block at Camlyball, near Newtownhamilton, Co. Armagh, has round eyes, contrasting with the lentoid eye forms that typify many instances of prehistoric stone heads.

The simplified style of the object suggests that the head could date from the Iron Age, although with an isolated find of this nature, it is never absolutely certain that it is of prehistoric origin.

Provenance: Found on the shores of the River Danube, circa 1930 by the present owner's grandfather, and assay marked at the time in Germany.

Other Notes: There are several types of rigid gold and sometimes bronze necklaces and collars of the later European Bronze Age, from around 1200 BC, many of which are classed as "torcs". They are mostly twisted in various conformations, including the "twisted ribbon" type, where a thin strip of gold is twisted into a spiral. Other examples twist a bar with a square or X section, or just use round wire, with both types in the three 12th- or 11th-century BC specimens found at Tiers Cross, Pembrokeshire, Wales. The Milton Keynes Hoard, contained two large examples of thicker rounded forms, as also used for bracelets. The quality of gold varied with 24 carat examples, such as this, being an indication of the status and importance of the individual that owned it. For example a hoard found at the Vix grave of a noble woman in France included a 24 carat torc weighing 500g.

Their commanding officer was Colonel R Spencer Chichester, a strongly right-wing Unionist who favoured purchasing guns for the YCV. Although officially called the YCV of Ireland it had no members beyond Belfast. The YCV was subsumed into the Ulster Volunteer Force during WWI.



According to Joseph Bouch, (The Republican Proclamation of Easter Monday, 1916 Dublin, 1936) these half sheets were printed on two different coloured papers. Less than twenty examples of these half sheets are recorded, making it even rarer than the full sheet document.



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217 General Sir J. G. Maxwell's Uniforms

General Sir John Grenfell Maxwell GCB, KCMG, CVO, DSO, PC (11 July 1859 – 21 February 1929) was a British Army officer and colonial governor. He served in the Mahdist War in the Sudan, the Boer War, and in the First World War, but he is best known for his role in the brutal suppression of the 1916 Easter Rising and subsequent execution of rebellion leaders.

After the Rising started, on 24 April 1916, Martial Law was declared for the city and county of Dublin by the Lord Lieutenant, Lord Wimborne, to allow Court Martial trials of persons breaching the Defence of the Realm Act (DORA), passed 8 August 1914 and to deal with such occurrences as the Rising.

Maxwell arrived in Ireland on Friday 28 April as "military governor" with "plenary powers" under Martial law. He set about dealing with the rebellion under his understanding of Martial law. During the week 2 to 9 May, Maxwell was in sole charge of trials and sentences by "field general court martial", which was trial without defence or jury and in camera. He had 3,400 people arrested, 183 civilians tried, 90 of whom were sentenced to death. Fifteen were executed by firing squad between 3 May and 12 May. Prime Minister H.H. Asquith and his government became concerned at the speed and secrecy of events before intervening to stop more executions. In particular, there was concern that Defence of the Realm (DORA) regulations of general court martial were not applied, i.e. a full court of thirteen members, a professional judge, legal advocate and held in public, which could have prevented some executions. Maxwell admitted in a report to Asquith in June that the impression that the leaders were killed in cold blood without trial had resulted in a 'revulsion of feeling' that had set in, in favour of the rebels, and was the result of the confusion between applying DORA as opposed to Martial law. Although Asquith promised to publish the court martial proceedings, they were not published until the 1990s.

Maxwell retired in 1922 and died, aged 69, in 1929. €10,000-€15,000 (£8,000-£12,000 approx)

From 1910 he sat as an Independent Nationalist and at the 1918 general election he was elected for Sinn Féin. The last great social and agrarian

campaign of the home rule movement – the Ranch War (1906 and 1909), was largely led and organised by Ginnell.

In Westminster he was highly critical of the British Government's war policy, and its executions of the Easter Rising leaders. On 9 May he accused the British Prime Minister H. H. Asquith, of "Murder", and was forcibly ejected from the assembly He was imprisoned in March 1918 for encouraging agitation, and later deported to Reading Gaol. In the 1918 general election, he was elected as a Sinn Féin MP and in 1919 sat in Dáil Éireann.. Ginnell was appointed Director of Propaganda of the Irish Republic. He was appointed the Representative of the Irish Republic in Argentina and South America. He opposed the Anglo-Irish Treaty and was elected as an anti-Treaty Sinn Féin TD at the 1922 general election. He returned to the United States soon after this to serve as the Ant-Treaty Republicans' envoy and died there in 1923. €800-€1,200 (£640-£960 approx)





Thomas "Tom" Hales (5 March 1892 – 29 April 1966) was an Irish Republican Army (IRA) volunteer and politician from West Cork. He was a friend of Michael Collins. Born at Knocknacurra, Ballinadee, near Bandon on a family farm owned by his father Robert who was an activist in the Land War and a reputed member of the Fenian Brotherhood. Tom Hales and his brothers, Seán, Bob and William, fought with the IRA in west Cork during the Irish War of Independence. A fifth brother, Donal, settled in Genoa from 1913, was appointed Irish Consular and Commercial Agent for Italy in February 1919. During the War, Tom was captured by the British Army in Cork and was badly beaten and tortured in an effort to make him disclose the whereabouts of prominent IRA figures, including Michael Collins. He never broke, though his co-accused, Patrick Harte suffered brain damage and died in hospital insane. The torture of Hales and Harte is believed to have influenced a scene in the film The Wind That Shakes the Barley in which an IRA officer's fingernails are pulled out.

During the Irish Civil War the Hales brothers fought on opposite sides. Tom Hales commanded the Flying Column which attacked the Free State Army convoy at Béal na Bláth which resulted in the death of his friend, Michael Collins. Allegedly Toms children are aware who fired the fatal bullet that killed Michael Collins but have never revealed his identity.

Hales was elected to Dáil Éireann as a Fianna Fáil TD for the Cork West constituency at the 1933 general election, but failed to retain his seat as an independent

candidate at the 1937 general election, and later contested elections unsuccessfully as an independent and as a member of Clann na Poblachta. €200-€300 (£160-£240 approx)

Seán McGarry (1885-1960) was one of the founders in 1909 of the Irish National Boy Scouts, also known as Na Fianna Éireann. McGarry was a prominent member of the Irish Republican Brotherhood and along with Countess Markievicz, Bulmer Hobson, Helena Moloney and Dr. Pat McCartan formed the first 'unofficial' Fianna Committee. McGarry fought in the GPO during the Easter Rising as his Tom Clarke's Aide de Camp. He was imprisoned in Frongoch camp following the Rising and afterwards became President of the Supreme Council of the IRB and General Secretary of the Irish Volunteers in 1917.

McGarry was one of those 'well-known' Republicans who were rounded up and imprisoned in the 'German Plot' of 1918. He later escaped from Lincoln Jail in February 1919 with Éamon de Valera. He fought in the War of Independence and became a Sinn Féin TD in 1921.

He supported the Treaty and was targeted by the anti-Treaty side during the Irish Civil war of 1922/23. In December 1922 his house was set on fire, allegedly by anti-Treaty forces and his son Emmett lost his life in the blaze.

Following the Civil War he briefly remained in politics, first with Cumann na nGaedheal, then with the National Party. He was a founder and later President of the 1916-21 Club which was set up in the 1940s to heal the divisions brought about by Civil War. €1,000-€1,500 (£800-£1,200 approx)





The assassination of Sir Henry Wilson was apparently authorised by the IRA and IRB in early 1921 but put on hold due to the Truce of June that year. With the signing of the Treaty the action should have been cancelled; it is therefore a matter of some controversy that it went ahead, possibly with the approval of either Michael Collins or Rory O'Connor. The letter, in this archive, from Dunn to Brian O'Gorman, implying Dunn's strong link to the Intelligence Office of the Provisional Government in Oriel House, might be evidence that the action was sanctioned by Collins. The killing of Wilson outraged the British Government, and, under immense pressure by Winston Churchill, the Provisional Government were forced to attack the anti-treaty forces using artillery supplied by the UK, thus starting the Civil War.

Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson, born in Co. Longford in 1864, was one of Britain's most distinguished army officers, serving as Chief of The Imperial Staff in 1918. He oversaw the British military operations, including "the war of terror" by the Auxiliaries, in Ireland during the War of Independence, and later became a Unionist MP for Co. Down. Reginald Dunn and Joseph O'Sullivan were former British soldiers who had served in France, fighting 'for the rights of small nationalities'; O'Sullivan lost a leg at Ypres. On returning to England they joined the IRA, with Dunn rising to be the commanding officer of London District.

JH MacDonnell, son of an Irish Nationalist MP, Mark Antony MacDonnell, was a distinguished London solicitor and member of the Irish Self Determination League. He defended many Irish republicans, including 1916 Rising participants.

In February 1917 he was arrested and deported to England where he was interned. On his release O'Kelly was elected to the Provisional Committee of the newly merged Irish National League and Sinn Féin, thereafter called Sinn Féin. He was appointed editor of the influential "Catholic Bulletin". In 1918 he was elected as a Sinn Féin MP for Louth and took his seat in Dáil Éireann and was Leas-Cheann Comhairle (Deputy chairman) from 1919-21. He was Secretary for Education in the Government of the 2nd Dáil. From 1919 to 1923, he was President of the Gaelic League. He opposed the Anglo-Irish Treaty After the resignation of Éamon de Valera as president of Sinn Féin in 1926, O'Kelly, who maintained an abstentionist policy towards Dáil Éireann, was elected in his place and remained in this position until 1931. €1,000-€1,500 (£800-£1,200 approx)


















